FROM THE PASTOR



ARE YOU A GIVER OR A TAKER?

We live in a world in which it seems that the ‘takers’ are taking over and the ‘givers’ are becoming fewer and fewer. This is a great concern for the secular and business world but it is an even greater concern for the Church. People are thus divided into, and identified as – givers and takers. Let’s take a few minutes to look at these two groups.

GIVERS are those people who realize that true happiness comes through serving others, by giving. Giving is not just about money or gifts but about time, energy, attention and self. We find many examples of givers in the New Testament. Givers see themselves as an ‘assignment’. In other words, life is about doing what God wants, not about what you want. A giver is someone who tries to be helpful to others (and in greater measure to the whole Church). Being helpful doesn’t mean that you just do what people want. It involves doing what is best for people.

A giver is also a person who does not mind being inconvenienced or interrupted by the needs of other people. It may be as simple as babysitting for someone so that they can have a night out even though you are ‘dog tired’ and just want to kick back and watch some television. Or helping someone pack up their apartment and move when all you really want to do is have one day off from the world. Sometimes being a giver is not glorious or glamorous and it might feel like a waste of time but it is necessary and, in the end, fulfilling.

A giver is also willing to sacrifice – to give of oneself in every way without expecting anything in return. In this way a giver has great impact. Givers are usually those who produce the most, can be trusted and are dedicated. Givers can be depended upon. This is so true in the secular, work world, in personal relationships and, of course, in our spiritual lives.

It is also true to state – God wants us all to be givers!

TAKERS live a life dedicated to taking, getting something for nothing; constantly talking about money; looking for what is in it for them; looking for the return and the reward. Takers are overly concerned with role and position, with their ‘Title’. Takers become upset when they are not given a certain title or don’t hold a particular position.

A taker is also very concerned with self-promotion. They use the words ‘I’ and ‘my’ rather than ‘we’ and ‘you’. Takers are very good at telling others how to do things but they do not get involved to reach those goals that they set for others. It seems that a taker is never wrong and everyone who does not do what they want is wrong. A taker is guided by the principle of ‘what is in it for me!’ taking no one and nothing else into account.

Takers are definitely “I” people – NOT what God wants in people!

Takers usually look at the weekly congregation and quickly point out what is wrong with attendance instead of glorifying God for those who are still faithful to the liturgical services. If they were in charge ‘things would be different’. They offer many suggestions of how to make worship better and more fulfilling but do nothing to reach those goals.

Takers find no joy and purpose in life. All they want is what they want. Nothing else! Takers are also ‘whiners’. “Why didn’t you do it this way?” “Why wasn’t I approached?”. “Why didn’t they ask me?” and so on and so forth.

Let’s get to the point. Are you willing to give your life to God? Are you willing to sacrifice for Him and your brothers and sisters in Christ? The guiding principle of givers is, “For whoever desires to save his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it” (Matthew 10:25).

Takers have to listen to this Scripture, digest it and then live it! Then they will turn into 'givers in Christ'. Then the world, the home and the Church will be a much better place.

So... answer honestly. Are you a giver or a taker?

THREE SAINTS OF MAY

St. Tamara (Tamar), Queen of Georgia - May 1

Tamara was the only child of King George III. Upon his death in 1184, she became Queen at the age of twenty-four. Despite her youth, she ruled the country with such wisdom and godliness - leading it to unprecedented military triumphs over the neighboring Moslem countries in defense of her kingdom, fostering arts and letters, and zealously strengthening Orthodoxy - that her reign is known as the Golden Age of Georgia. After her coronation, she convoked a local council to correct disorders in church life. When the bishops had assembled from all parts of her kingdom, she, like Saint Constantine at the First Ecumenical Council, honored them as if she were a commoner, and they Angels of God; exhorting them to establish righteousness and redress abuses, she said in her humility, "Do away with every wickedness, beginning with me, for the prerogative of the throne is in no wise that of making war against God." Saint Tamara called herself "the father of orphans and the judge of widows," and her contemporaries called her "King" instead of "Queen." She herself led her army against the Moslems and fearlessly defeated them; because of the reverence that even the enemies of Georgia had for her, entire mountain tribes renounced Islam and were baptized. She built countless churches and monasteries throughout her kingdom, and was benefactress also to the Holy Land, Mount Athos, and holy places in Greece and Cyprus. She has always been much beloved by her people, who have memorialized her meekness, wisdom, piety, and obedience, and peace loving nature in innumerable legends, ballads, and songs; the poem written in her honor by Shota Rustaveli, "The Knight in the Panther Skin," is the masterpiece of Georgian literature. The great Queen Tamara departed the earthly kingdom for the heavenly in the year 1212.

St. Mocius Hieromartyr - May 11

Mocius, who was of Roman parents, lived during the reign of Diocletian, and was a priest in Amphipolis of Thrace. One day as the idolaters were assembled, and the Proconsul Laodicius was offering sacrifice to Dionysus, Mocius entered the temple and overturned the altar. After many torments, through which he was preserved whole by grace divine, he was sent to Byzantium, where he was beheaded about the year 288. Saint Constantine the Great built a magnificent church in honour of Saint Mocius in Constantinople, where his holy relics were enshrined. He is one of the Holy Unmercenaries.

SS. Constantine and Helen, Equal-to-the Apostles - May 21

This great and renowned sovereign of the Christians was the son of Constantius Chlorus (the ruler of the westernmost parts of the Roman empire), and of the blessed Helen. He was born in 272, in (according to some authorities) Naissus of Dardania, a city on the Hellespont. In 306, when his father died, he was proclaimed successor to his throne. In 312, on learning that Maxentius and Maximinus had joined forces against him, he marched into Italy, where, while at the head of his troops, he saw in the sky after midday, beneath the sun, a radiant pillar in the form of a cross with the words: "By this shalt thou conquer." The following night, our Lord Jesus Christ appeared to him in a dream and declared to him the power of the Cross and its significance. When he arose in the morning, he immediately ordered that a labarum be made (which is a banner or standard of victory over the enemy) in the form of a cross, and he inscribed on it the Name of Jesus Christ. On the 28th Of October, he attacked and mightily conquered Maxentius, who drowned in the Tiber River while fleeing. The following day, Constantine entered Rome in triumph and was proclaimed Emperor of the West by the Senate, while Licinius, his brother-in-law, ruled in the East. But out of malice, Licinius later persecuted the Christians. Constantine fought him once and again, and utterly destroyed him in 324, and in this manner he became monarch over the West and the East. Under him and because of him all the persecutions against the Church ceased. Christianity triumphed and idolatry was overthrown. In 325 he gathered the First Ecumenical Council in Nicaea, which he himself personally addressed. In 324, in the ancient city of Byzantium, he laid the foundations of the new capital of his realm, and solemnly inaugurated it on May 11, 330, naming it after himself, Constantinople. Since the throne of the imperial rule was transferred thither from Rome, it was named New Rome, the inhabitants of its domain were called Romans, and it was considered the

continuation of the Roman Empire. Falling ill near Nicomedia, he requested to receive divine Baptism, according to Eusebius (The Life of Constantine. Book IV, 61-62), and also according to Socrates and Sozomen; and when he had been deemed worthy of the Holy Mysteries, he reposed in 337, on May 21 or 22, the day of Pentecost, having lived sixty-five years, of which he ruled for thirty-one years. His remains were transferred to Constantinople and were deposited in the Church of the Holy Apostles, which had been built by him.

As for his holy mother Helen, after her son had made the Faith of Christ triumphant throughout the Roman Empire, she undertook a journey to Jerusalem and found the Holy Cross on which our Lord was crucified. After this, Saint Helen, in her zeal to glorify Christ, erected churches in Jerusalem at the sites of the Crucifixion and Resurrection, in Bethlehem at the cave where our Saviour was born, another on the Mount of Olives whence He ascended into Heaven, and many others throughout the Holy Land, Cyprus, and elsewhere. She was proclaimed Augusta, her image was stamped upon golden coins, and two cities were named Helenopolis after her in Bithynia and in Palestine. Having been thus glorified for her piety, she departed to the Lord being about eighty years of age, according to some in the year 330, according to others, in 336.






